19	"Dear Executive Director,
20	Thank you for providing quality,
21	affordable housing for eligible families, and
22	supporting families' efforts to achieve and
23	sustain self-sufficiency. HUD is committed to
24	continuing to support Public Housing Agencies in
25	this work, while balancing the need for scarce

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resources to go to those most in need of affordable housing. Therefore, this letter provides an update on HUD's response to OIG Audit 2015-PH-002, regarding significantly over-income families residing in public housing.

"On September 3, 2015, all PHAs received a letter with a reminder of the discretion under existing regulations for PHAs to limit the number of over-income families in public housing and to strongly encourage the use of this discretion to remove extremely-over-income families from public housing. PHAs were encouraged to adopt local over-income policies that consider a variety of factors, including family stability, hardship considerations, and preferences for return should a family's income decrease after leaving the public housing program.

"On February 3, 2016, HUD published an Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (ANPR) in the Federal Register, seeking comments from the public regarding how HUD can structure policies to reduce the number of individuals and families in public housing whose incomes significantly exceed the income limit for a sustained period of

time after initial admission. HUD is utilizing the ANPR process because the issue of over-income families is complex and has an effect on families that are working to sustain and maintain self-sufficiency, as well as program costs. HUD believes that a thorough, transparent process to receive feedback from PHAs and stakeholders is essential to properly inform HUD's policy considerations.

"Once again, HUD encourages the adoption of local PHA policies to address extremely-over-income families in public housing. PHAs are reminded that all policies, including policies to limit over-income families, must be memorialized in their Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policies (ACOP). If the PHA does not have a policy regarding the eviction of over-income families in its ACOP, HUD considers that PHA to have declined, to date, to exercise its discretion to limit over-income families. PHAs are also reminded that all changes to occupancy policies require a change to the ACOP by Board resolution, and must be adopted as part of the Annual PHA Plan process or the PHA Plan Significant Amendment Process.

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"We look forward to working with you to ensure that public housing remains a valuable public resource for our nation's most vulnerable families."

THE CHAIRMAN: Now, let me ask a question on that letter. Does that mean that we could have a percentage of higher income?

Because my problem is when you get rid of some of them that are a little high, and then you get, you would have a problem financing this whole thing over here, you know, keeping it up to where it is right now.

I'm not saying 20 or 30, but I think there should be a balance there.

MR. MANFREDI: Mr. Chairman, at least on the legal side I spoke to Ms. Gilmore more about this as soon as she received the notice on this. And one of the things of concern is that HUD is now telling us to amend our Admissions and Occupancy policy to actually provide that we will evict those that are over income.

THE CHAIRMAN: It didn't say 100 percent.

MR. MANFREDI: It says all, which is a problem.

THE CHAIRMAN: It didn't say that in there.

MR. MANFREDI: The way it reads is that we have to put it in our Admissions and Occupancy policy that we have a means, that we will commit to evicting families that are over income.

What I'd like to point out is in New Jersey you can't evict someone for that reason. There's a very, very strict law that only sets forth 18 bases upon which you can evict a resident. So there's a notice and comment period on this notice, and what I spoke to Ms. Gilmore about, what I would suggest is working with the staff and the Executive Director is to make a comment back to the author, which we can do, to identify this as a problem.

I don't know if they'll change it, but it's going to be impractical for this Housing Authority to bring eviction cases against someone because they're over income.

The other part of it, if I may say, is what HUD wants us to do is amend our Admissions and Occupancy policy. They want to see it in the policy, and that's very often how HUD acts. But this policy that will go to our residents.

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1 So my suggestion is, and I'll welcome 2 Ms. Gilmore's input and Mr. Rogers', is that we 3 write the comment back. But if HUD does insist we can amend the policy, because we don't want to be found to be in violation of the HUD notice. 6 But we cannot evict anyone. It's a concern, Mr. 7 Chairman, a real concern. 8 THE CHAIRMAN: Because, you know, I 9 know we've always had a certain amount that were 10 on a higher income level. 11 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Which state 12 supersedes federal? 13 MR. MANFREDI: Yes. 14 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: So it's a moot 15 point. 16 MS. GILMORE: I know. 17 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: That's exactly what it is. So we want to make ourself right 18 with the federal. 19 20 MR. MANFREDI: Yes. 21 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: So adopt the 22 policy. Put a resolution in and just say, you 23 know. And then at the bottom put a line in that 24 says, you know, the language above is superseded

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by the state law.

2	to proceed, Commissioner. There's no point in
3	taking on the Federal Government over this.
4	We'll revise the ACOP, this way we'll
5	satisfy HUD.
