COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Not on the boiler, but I do have a question about the playground and the water park that we're looking at. Did we put any bids out yet?

MS. GILMORE: We have to see how much the boiler upgrades are going to be.

THE CHAIRMAN: We can plan to prepare something as far as the upgrades. We'll play around and get some input, probably from our tenant representative, whoever that is, Lindy, and maybe Art Pettigrew; we put you two in charge of it. And at least have something in the works, even if we're not able to do it, but you never know. I mean, some money might come in the budget for next year, whatever the case is.

MS. GILMORE: The agenda. I mean, this

1 year --

THE CHAIRMAN: My feeling is if you wait until you get your budget, and then you, you know, at least have something to say, hey, this is a concept that we would like to go forward with. We've had a couple discussions about that.

Joan?

MS. MICHAELSON: I did try grant -- (inaudible) about equipment. He's trying to put to something out for me.

THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. But at least let's come up with a plan. So if something does come available, a grant or some other extra, you know, maybe we can go to the county for CDPG monies or something that might want to upgrade a local playground.

COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Or maybe we could encumber some money this year, and maybe the following year.

THE CHAIRMAN: Possibly. My feeling is at least let's come up with some type of concept and a plan. And at least we have something on the shelf ready to go should we come across some money.

MR. GILMORE: Artie, if you want to

| 15 | of, instead of the seal they have loops that the |
| 16 | kids can run through and they spray down on the |
| 17 | pavement. |
| 18 | COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Let's get |
| 19 | together and plan it. Tell them what we exactly |
| 20 | want, let them put it in a spec, and see what |
| 21 | it's for. |
| 22 | COMMISSIONER MUSTILLI: Yeah. |
| 23 | THE CHAIRMAN: I know LAN has a |
| 24 | playground consultant that they work with, so I'm |

sure that they can come up with something.

MR. GILMORE: Yeah. The last time we did a playground, I can actually probably get an updated book. But, like I said, what we're looking at is trying -- I'm not sure what we're looking at is problem number one, and how much space we have to deal with, because --

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I would ask the planning committee. Here's the space, you want to kind of redo this. We have some input from Commissioners, input from your department, and see what they can come up with. They might say keep the same and add this, or get rid of everything and try this.

COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Right. So let's see what they have. We'll find out.

THE CHAIRMAN: I'll leave that with you, Commissioner Pettigrew and Commissioner Mustilli.

Maintenance report. Gene, anything to report?

MR. GILMORE: Nothing much, besides that. During our inspection each year, our HUD inspection, they went to a new inspection plan, okay. So what they're doing is they're requiring us to have GFIs on every refrigerator. Outlets

that are 6 feet within --1 2 MS. GILMORE: Or they pop, they pop. COMMISSIONER MILLER: Putting a GFI on 3 4 a refrigerator -- and I'm talking about from personal experience and being a landlord -- is 5 6 without a doubt, the dumbest thing. If they're 7 coming up with and they would find a way -because if the GFI pops, instead of a snap like 8 that, you now have to pull your refrigerator. And then from the landlord's point of view --10 11 THE CHAIRMAN: You know that's going to 12 happen in someone's apartment on a Saturday --13 MR. GILMORE: The GFIs that are 14 installed have alarms on them. It's not 15 something we cannot do. 16 COMMISSIONER MILLER: Can you put them 17 on the outlet? Not behind the refrigerator, but gang it in series --18 19 MR. GILMORE: You have to remember --COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: -- in the breaker 20 21 box. 22 MR. GILMORE: -- we're still dealing 23 with no wire. The only way you cannot have them is if it's a direct line, okay, a dedicated line. 24

And the only option for us is to put the GFI --

and we've had a problem in apartments, but it
hasn't been overwhelming. The newer
refrigerators are less sensitive to the GFIs,
okay. So we're testing them out. But, also, our
kitchens are very small, so within six, it's
within 6 feet of the sink.

COMMISSIONER MUSTILLI: I agree.

THE CHAIRMAN: It's a troublesome thought to think that, you know, if the GFI pops up and you're not home, you don't know.

MR. GILMORE: Unless we're going to run a direct line to every refrigerator in this complex, this is our best option.

COMMISSIONER MILLER: What I'm saying here, Gene, if you put your refrigerator back here, and just put it, the junction box over here with a GFI, and then run it to the -- it's the fact that it's behind the refrigerator that someone's food is going to spoil as opposed to, oh, I have it in the back, I can push the button and it's there.

I understand the problem that you have with all the wiring and like that. But I would say it would be easier and less headaches for the units if you put it one outlet before the

refrigerator, and it does the same thing. 1 2 MR. GILMORE: Right, I understand. What I'm saying is every outlet within 6 feet of 3 the sink has to have a GFI. Now, our apartments are less than 6 feet in the kitchen areas, so we do have to install GFIs. Even if it's not for 7 the refrigerator, it's 6 feet within the refrigerator. So it would have to be a GFI. 9 that's only the beginning. We have to install smoke alarms in 10 11 every bedroom for HUD requirements, okay. Last 12 time they came in they failed us for every bedroom that didn't have it. 13 COMMISSIONER MILLER: 14 Hardwired? 15 MR. GILMORE: No, they can be battery-operated. 16 17 COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: I have a question. You said the GFI has an alarm? 18 19 MR. GILMORE: It has an alarm on it. 2.0 COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: Which would, it's 21 a loud alarm that the person can hear? MR. GILMORE: Yeah. 22 It's not the 23 decibels of a smoke alarm, but... 24 COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: But you can hear 25 it, you can hear it if you need to?

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MR. GILMORE: Yes. We've done two buildings and we're testing them out, so we'll know, okay. I'm not sure that -- they also have ones that you just plug in, but if the tenant removes it and we go back to the apartment, they're going to fail.

COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: So smoke detectors in every bedroom. What about carbon monoxide detectors?

MR. GILMORE: It's smoke/carbon monoxide. And we're also, we're putting carbon monoxide in. They're not requiring that.

They're only requiring smokes, but to beat the curve we're going to put the combo in because it does fire and does everything else. And that's what we're starting to install. We finished Building 1 already, because we're also doing the repairs for the apartments from the inspection.

COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: One more question, Gene. So in a three bedroom -- I know the layout because I grew up in -- so you have to put one in each bedroom, or right outside the common area of the hallway where the --

MR. GILMORE: Smokes are required in each bedroom. Smokes and CO are required within

1 3 feet. So the ones that are in the hallways now are not CO. So we're switching them out to CO 3 because they were heat, they were smoke and heat. So we're switching them out. COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: To smoke and CO. 6 MR. GILMORE: It's combination smoke 7 and CO. COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: So one smoke and 8 CO in the three-bedroom, and then the three 10 smokes in the bedrooms. Because the smoke/CO 11 combos are like 50 bucks each, so you're 12 talking... MR. GILMORE: But there's no -- because 13 14 of the change we can go cap with it. Like I 15 said, we've started it already. 16 THE CHAIRMAN: Getting back to GFI. 17 they tend to pop when there's a power failure? 18 MR. GILMORE: Not necessarily. It's 19 not like a surge. It's basically from the 20 machine. 21 COMMISSIONER CHOFFO: Overload. 22 MR. GILMORE: Some of the other

refrigerators are more sensitive. In other

words, they set off GFIs.

THE CHAIRMAN: For the most part,

though, the authority installs the refrigerator;
am I correct?

3 MR. GILMORE: Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: So how old would you say the oldest refrigerator is?

MR. GILMORE: We've had -- that's hard to say. Probably about, we've just had a majority of them replaced about seven years ago or eight years ago when Paco was here. Remember when they did the windows?

So like I said, what we're looking at now, the ones we had installed, looking at the dates to see if we can pinpoint which ones are setting them off. But we've only had, in a building and a half we've only had two with a problem. Two went off.

THE CHAIRMAN: Were they easily correctable, was it something with the GFI switch?

MR. GILMORE: Well, in a situation like that, okay, we tried to put it somewhere. But what we can do is a dedicated line only has one receptacle. Like your air conditioner that you might have, instead of 220, it's just 120. So we put one of those in that indicates that it's the

1 right model.

with a brand-new stackable washer/dryer, a big one, not the small one, in my mom's apartments, brand new. And we're saying, well, it just stopped working. And it turned out, after DCR (sic) just came out, it was the ground fault outlet popped. I don't know if they were using the Steam Fresh in it that popped it. And I couldn't pull it out myself, because it's gigantic, it's like humongous. But I don't know why they even put it on there.

MR. GILMORE: Well, it's New Jersey
State, so they justify it. So, like I said,
we're experimenting with them. And so far we've
been pretty good. Like I said, we've only had
two. Once we try to narrow down a year, because
the newer once aren't as draining as the older
ones are. The only other option is to rewire a
brand-new direct line to each refrigerator.

COMMISSIONER CONFESSORE: But they're within 6 feet. If they're within 6 feet don't you have to have a ground fault?

MR. GILMORE: That's what I'm saying.

A direct line, it's called a dedicated line.

| 16 | the refrigerator, it does not have to be ground |
| 17 | GFI. |
| 18 | COMMISSIONER CONFESSORE: Okay. Got |
| 19 | it. |
| 20 | MR. GILMORE: If anybody comes up with |
| 21 | a better idea, I'm open for suggestions. |
| 22 | COMMISSIONER CONFESSORE: Because they |
| 23 | probably have a microwave on the same row, in |
| 24 | case the ground fault |
| 25 | MR. GILMORE: It doesn't matter, they |

1 don't trip because of draw. 2 COMMISSIONER CONFESSORE: No, no, I 3 mean because if it's snapping off or shutting 4 down, like because of the refrigerator and the 5 microwave on the same fault. Because they're not dedicated. Usually the microwave is dedicated. 7 Right. 8 MR. GILMORE: That would affect the 9 panel, not the GFI. The GFI is not going to 10 break, unless there's a short. It measures the 11 electricity going in and the electricity going 12 out. If that offsets, that's what breaks. 13 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Maybe instead 14 of refrigerators we can give them coolers. 15 THE CHAIRMAN: And you can take your 16 cooler to the new playground. 17 Okay. Any other questions for Gene? 18 Motion to approve the maintenance report? 19 COMMISSIONER PETTIGREW: Motion. 20 COMMISSIONER CONFESSORE: Second. 2.1 MS. GILMORE: And the management 22 report. 23 THE CHAIRMAN: We did that already. 24 MS. GILMORE: No, we didn't vote on
